

TIGRITUDES

1956 - 2021 Panafrican Film Cycle

On 1st January, 1956, Sudan celebrated its independence and opened a cycle of hope that continued throughout the continent for more than 30 years: a phase of independence that, if we consider the overseas departments and territories, is not yet complete. Yet who has heard of the rich and pioneering filmography of Sudan - brutally interrupted by el-Bashir regime and the first war in Darfur?



Filmmakers **Dyana Gaye** (*Saint Louis Blues, Under the starry sky*) and **Valérie Osouf** (*Cameroon: Autopsy of an Independence, Abderrahmane Sissako: Beyond Territories*), are the curators of *Tigritudes*, a subjective and chronological anthology of panafrican cinemas, born of their crossed views, common and complementary cinephilias.

Initiated within the framework of the *Africa2020 Season* and co-produced by the *Forum des Images* in Paris, this cycle of unprecedented scope will open up a vast field of reflection, crossing entire sections of history and narratives, questioning reality and its representations, deconstructing, among other things, the viewers' imaginary.

This vast filmography circulating from Algiers to Los Angeles, from Johannesburg to Conakry, from Port-au-Prince to Maputo, putting in perspective works that have never ceased to unfold with an exceptional stylistic, thematic and linguistic plurality, only asks to convey *its own words to the world: aesthetic, ethical and political.*

From 1956 to 2021, Tigritudes

is constituted of 66 screenings, one per year, which propose to chronologically perceive and appreciate the field of a postcolonial circulation of forms, struggles and ideas throughout the African continent.

In order to extend the scope of proposals and correspondence, 12 screenings of films from the Afro-descendant diaspora



will also be presented, from the Caribbean to the United Kingdom, via the United States to Cuba, with films such as *Pressure* by the London-based Trinidadian filmmaker Horace Hové, *De cierta manera* by Cuban filmmaker Sara Gomez or experimental short film *Four women* by Julie Dash (USA)...



THE INAUGURATION **OF THE CYCLE WILL TAKE PLACE** FROM JANUARY 12 TO *FEBRUARY 27, 2022,* AT THE FORUM DES IMAGES IN PARIS.

As it is concerned with inscribing the continent in the world's chant, *Tigritudes* will also present 2 master classes, 6 « Leçons de Cinéma » and cross-disciplinary discussions, where the curators will invite artists from other fields (painting, music, photography...) and intellectuals from different backgrounds (philosophers, writers, historians...) to dialogue around the works in order to cross perspectives, aesthetics, generations so that stories of cinema resonate.

A panafrican cycle

Tigritudes will strive to propose *works from as many countries as possible*, including those whose filmography is still relatively rare: *Mother I am suffocating This is my last film about you,* by Lemohang Jeremiah Mosese (Lesotho), *The Unseen* by Perivi John Katjavivi (Namibia), or *The Battle of Tabatô,* shot in Guinea-Bissau (a country that is not often the setting for films) by Angolan Joao Viana.

It will not overlook works that are better known to the general public. For filmmakers with a extensive filmography, as is the case for some Senegalese, Malians, Burkinabes, Egyptians, Algerians, Tunisians and Moroccans, we will endeavor to present work that is not widely distributed and less known to the public.

A CYCLE THAT REFLECTS THE DIVERSITY OF FORMS

We wish to present *works of all genres and lengths* : animation, documentary and fiction mingled with experimental cinema and contemporary art films (*11 Drawings for projection* by South African artist William Kentridge, *Habiter le Monde* by Hamedine Kane (Mauritania, Senegal), *An excavation of us* by Shirley Bruno (Haïti)...



A CINEMA THAT TALKS ABOUT THE WORLD

Pierre Yaméogo made a beautiful film about the Lebanese community, *Silmandé*; Congolese Joseph Kumbela went to China for his short film *The Stranger from Africa*; Nigerian Ola Balogun shot *Black Goddess* in Brazil, American Ossie Davis made two features films in Nigeria...

The continent has always been open; it looks out!

A CYCLE FOR YOUNG AUDIENCES

We are also keen for this program to be aimed at young viewers, so that it contributes to their discovery of films intended for them. These screenings will be articulated around a feature film or a program of short films : *Diplomate à la tomate* by Samba Félix N'Diaye (Senegal), *Mwansa the great* by Rungano Nyoni (Zambia), *Da Yie* by Anthony N'ti (Ghana)... on't look at me like that,



AN ITINERANT CYCLE

After its Parisian exhibition, it seems essential to us that this program circulates as widely as possible. It will therefore travel in 2022, in its entirety or by module/decade, on the African continent, in the overseas territories, and more widely throughout the world, particularly in the USA.

The premiere of this tour will take place in the spring of 2022, at the Ciné Guimbi in Bobo-Dioulasso (and its region, through the Cinomade itinerant circuit), in partnership with Les Films du Djabadjah.

We plan to associate with this tour: the publication of **a book Tigritudes** (texts, interviews around the program) and **a DVD edition** of some titles of the cycle.

Finally, *Tigritudes* will also take the shape of a quadrilingual website (French, English, Arabic, Portuguese), in order to share this extensive research with those who did not have access to the screenings. The works will be put into context with the creation of an archive frieze, nourished by texts from a wide range of authors.
